#### OC San U

OC San's training and development program is being offered to all member agencies. A letter is being sent to city/agency staff with specific program information, course content, and availability. For more information on the program, emails can be sent to ocsanu@ocsan.gov.

#### **Biosolids Compost Program**

In an effort to help cities with SB 1383 requirements, OC San has a Compost Outreach Program that includes a toolbox, videos, and options to sample our compost. City staff can visit <a href="www.ocsan.gov/compost">www.ocsan.gov/compost</a> for information and resources on reaching SB 1383 compliance.

#### General Manager's Work Plan Mid-Year Update

Each year, the General Manager prepares a <u>work plan of activities</u> to be accomplished during the fiscal year. In August 2021, the 2021/2022 General Manager's Work Plan was approved with 23 goals under four categories: Business Principles, Environmental Stewardship, Wastewater Management, and Workplace Environment. At mid-year, five items have reached completion and all remaining items are on track to be completed by, or prior to, the end of the fiscal year and the deadline of the overall work plan.

#### **Bay Bridge Pump Station Location Identified**

The Board of Director's hosted a public hearing and took action to adopt a Resolution of Necessity to move forward on the design for the Bay Bridge Pump Station in the City of Newport Beach. This pump station is critical to convey wastewater from the city to OC San's treatment facility in Huntington Beach.

#### **OC San Sewer Construction Project Updates**

Los Alamitos/Seal Beach/Rossmoor specific – Manhole construction on the Los Alamitos Trunk Sewer Project has begun. Over the next couple of weeks daywork will begin on Los Alamitos Blvd. and nightwork will continue on Katella Avenue and portions of Los Alamitos Blvd./Seal Beach Blvd. The entire project is expected to be completed by winter 2023.

Anaheim/Buena Park specific — Construction on the <u>Orange-Western Trunk Sewer Project</u> is starting next month on Western Avenue just north of Crescent Avenue. The project will clean the pipeline, reinforce the pipe joints, replace or rehabilitate manholes, and replace segments of pipe. Public outreach efforts are underway.

Westminster specific – On the Westminster Sewer Project, construction is taking place on Westminster Blvd. between Bolsa Chica Road and Rancho Road with the excavation of access pits in preparation of slip-lining the second pipeline. Actual slip-lining work of the second pipeline will begin after the wet weather season ends in mid-April to ensure there is enough capacity during heavy rain events.

Fountain Valley specific: Foundation work on the new <u>Headquarters building</u> is ongoing and about 50 percent complete. Construction at Plant No. 1 has begun which will include demolition of trailers in preparation for the new pedestrian bridge that will connect the new Headquarters to Plant No. 1. Also at Plant No. 1 is construction of the <u>Security Improvement Project</u>. The chain-link fence along Ward Avenue is being replaced with an 8-foot block wall with new landscaping and added security enhancements.

#### **BOARDS SELECT 2022 CHAIRS AND VICE CHAIRS**

On January 13, the San Joaquin Hills Transportation Corridor Agency (SJHTCA) and Foothill/Eastern Transportation Corridor Agency (F/ETCA) Boards of Directors held leadership elections for the current calendar year. The SJHTCA Board of Directors unanimously elected Newport Beach Councilmember Will O'Neill as Chair and Laguna Hills Mayor Pro Tempore Janine Heft as Vice Chair. The F/ETCA Board of Directors unanimously re-elected Yorba Linda Councilmember Peggy Huang as Chair and Dana Point Mayor Joe Muller as Vice Chair.

Director O'Neill succeeds Mission Viejo Councilmember Trish Kelley after two terms as Chair of the SJHTCA. Former Chairwoman Kelley and O'Neill worked as a team to oversee historic successes for the Agency that included navigating the COVID-19 pandemic and overseeing the successful reduction in debt service payments of \$138.7 million, net of all transaction costs. without extending bond maturity dates. Chair O'Neill served as part of the leadership for the Agencies' Joint Finance & Investment Committee that developed and garnered Board support for adoption of Debt Management Policies that have further strengthened the Agencies' cash position while creating additional flexibility to pay down other bonds early or invest in key capital projects. Kelley will continue to serve as a Director for the SJHTCA.

Chair Huang continues in her leadership role for the F/ETCA Board after overseeing similar success with a bond refunding which resulted in savings of \$214 million and positioned the Agency for a potential early pay down of \$125 million in principle in 2022. She was also at the helm for opening the Oso Parkway Bridge to traffic and advancing the 241/91 Express Connector project. Huang is actively engaged in policy discussions at the regional and state levels and was recently named one of Orange County's 125 top influencers by *The Orange County Register*.

## CUSTOMER SERVICE CENTER SYSTEM CONTRACT AMENDMENT APPROVED

The SJHTCA and F/ETCA Boards of Directors unanimously approved an amendment to extend the Customer Service Center back-office system contract with BRiC-TPS. The contract's amendment provides authorization for continued maintenance until the transition to the new customer service back-office system is in place. The transition is expected to occur in summer 2022.







## February 2022

Below are upcoming items for the February 9 regular meeting. Due to the pandemic, this meeting will be conducted virtually. Zoom sign-in information for Commissioners will be distributed to the Board in the coming week, and public access will be published in the agenda by February 2.

#### **OC LAFCO Policies and Procedures Updates**

At the February meeting, the Commission will consider amendments to the agency's personnel policies and procedures. A review of the administrative policies that include personnel, records and retention and public records requests is performed annually to ensure consistency and compliance with any changes in state and federal laws.

#### **Legislative Policy Guidelines Update**

A review and update to the Commission's legislative policy and guidelines is identified in the FY 2021-2022 OC LAFCO Work Plan. Originally adopted by the Commission in May 1999, the policy guides the Commission and staff in the review of legislation of LAFCO-interest and adoption of positions on bills. At the next meeting, the Commission will receive a report on recommended updates to the policy and guidelines to further support the effectiveness of the Commission on the legislative front.

#### **Six-Month Strategic Objectives Update**

The report will provide an update on three key objectives that were identified by the Commission to be completed by February 2022. These objectives are shown in the chart below.

#### Municipal Services Dashboard and Shared Services Program Virtual Presentations

Two new milestones completed! We are excited to unveil the **Municipal Services Dashboard** and the latest improvements to the **Shared Services Program**. The Dashboard not only serves as a great resource to the public but was developed to maintain ongoing demographic information for our local agencies and assist in streamlining data requests for future MSRs. Secondly, the newly improved Shared Services Program has been integrated with the OC LAFCO website and is available for use by our local agencies. The Program was enhanced in response to requests from some special districts to provide a resource focused on shared services opportunities. The Commission will receive a virtual presentation of the programs at the February meeting. Next steps — Getting the agencies to sign up!

#### **LAFCO Appointments**

At its most recent Board meeting, the Board of Supervisors reappointed Commissioner Bartlett and Vice Chair Wagner to the Regular County Member seats. Additionally, and through the action of the Board, we welcome back Supervisor Andrew Do as the LAFCO Alternate County Member. Commissioner Do served briefly as the Alternate County Member in 2015 and will be seated at the February meeting.

#### Congratulations - It's Official!

At the July 21 CALAFCO Board meeting, the Board officially appointed Commissioner Derek J. McGregor to the Executive Board. In this role, Commissioner McGregor will serve as one of the four Board members representing the southern region LAFCOs (Imperial, Los Angeles, Orange, Riverside, San Bernadino, and San Diego).

#### **LAFCO Center Stage**

Continuing the effort of optimizing external relations and sharing OC LAFCO news, on February 9, Executive Officer Carolyn Emery will present an introduction to LAFCO to the State of California Tax Managers. In part to the presentation, she will discuss the collaboration of LAFCOs and the County Auditor-Controller Offices involving boundary changes and the process involving the consolidation of tax rate areas. Approximately 70 Tax Managers from across the State are expected to attend the event in Irvine.

On February 23, Executive Officer Carolyn Emery has been invited to share OC LAFCO's experience with hiring during the pandemic as a panelist for a CALAFCO webinar that will highlight best practices for employee recruitment during the pandemic.

#### **Agency Outreach**

Staff has been requested by the City of San Clemente to participate in their February 1<sup>st</sup> City Council meeting to address questions on the annexation process. During previous discussions, the City was made aware of the Commission's current effort and objectives for South Orange County.

Additionally, staff has been invited to participate in the Placentia's City Council meeting on February 15. At the meeting, the council will be discussing initiating the annexation of the Hamer unincorporated island. Staff will be in attendance to address any questions from Councilmembers or residents on the annexation process.

## REGIONAL COUNCIL APPROVES REAP 2.0 APPLICATION FOR ADVANCE FUNDING

SCAG's Regional Council today approved a resolution authorizing the application for and acceptance of the advance funding for the Regional Early Action Planning Grant Program for 2021 (REAP 2021). SCAG staff will now apply for funding of up to 10 percent of the \$246 million available to SCAG to support outreach and engagement, early studies and partnerships for program development, expansion of existing Connect SoCal implementation programs, and development of a full program application.

## JOINT POLICY COMMITTEE RECEIVES CONNECT SOCAL UPDATE

Today, SCAG held a Joint Policy Committee meeting to provide members with an update on the development of Connect SoCal 2024. The meeting included presentations by staff followed by a panel discussion with regional partners.

#### PRELIMINARY REGIONAL AND COUNTY GROWTH PROJECTIONS

Among the first steps in Connect SoCal 2024 is the development of growth projections for households, employment, and population in the region and six counties to the year 2050. With the help of an expert panel and consultants, staff developed a technical approach and high, medium and low growth scenarios for discussion. Fewer births, the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic and new data from Census 2020 all suggest that the region's future population growth will be much slower than previously expected. However, the strength of the region's economic base, innovation hubs, welcoming culture and encouraging signs about housing production indicate that growth to 2050 will be only slightly below the middle growth scenario titled "Slower Growth, Steady Improvement."

#### **EMERGING ISSUES UPDATE**

With the approval of Connect SoCal 2020, the Regional Transportation Plan and Sustainable Communities Strategy, SCAG outlined several data and trends that were impacted by COVID-19 including transportation funding, congestion and travel behavior, goods movement and supply chain demand, and housing production. In addition to the pandemic-influenced changes occurring within the region, SCAG also identified multiple emerging issues that would need to be more fully addressed in the next plan, Connect SoCal 2024, including equity, regional resilience and economic opportunity. Throughout 2022, staff will continue to work with partners and policymakers to address these trends and issues facing the region.

Continuing the discussion, Executive Director Kome Ajise moderated a panel discussion with Anne Mayer, Riverside County Transportation Commission; Darrell Johnson, Orange County Transportation Authority; Lynn von Koch-Liebert, California Strategic Growth Council; and Seleta Reynolds, Los Angeles Department of Transportation, to hear their perspectives on the recent trends and priorities for the upcoming plan. ## REGIONAL COUNCIL APPROVES FUNDING FOR THREE SCAG PROGRAMS

The Regional Council today approved \$6.75 million in awards for the Last Mile Freight Program Phase 1 Contingency List Projects and to extend the program contract by 18 months; the acceptance of one-time funds of \$238,977 to support the Los Angeles Cleantech Incubator-led project, "Testing and Evaluation of Curb Management and Integrated Strategies to Catalyze Market Adoption of Electric Vehicles;" and \$30,000 for a partner program with the University of California-Irvine for an AI-Based Mobility Monitoring System and Analytics Demonstration Pilot.

#### **ACTION**

REGIONAL COUNCIL APPROVES 2022 REGIONAL TRANSPORTATION SAFETY TARGETS

The Regional Council today adopted the 2022 Regional Transportation Safety Targets. The Federal Highway Administration mandates that states, working with Metropolitan Planning Organizations, are required to establish targets for reducing the numbers and rates of transportation fatalities and serious injuries. To meet this requirement, SCAG has adopted region-specific targets consistent with SCAG's new safety models, which consider traffic, socioeconomic and other trends. The adopted resolution reaffirms SCAG's regional leadership role and commitment to achieving these targets by advancing activities outlined in Connect SoCal and the Regional Safety Strategy and endorses Zero Deaths as part of a comprehensive effort to achieve zero transportation-related fatalities and serious injuries in the SCAG region.
